Tríp Report - Bora Bora

Seven-and-ahalf hours in a 747 out of LAX landed us in Papeetee. We boarded a 40p a s s e n g e r puddle jumper for the 35minute flight to the coral island or "motu"



where the airstrip is at Bora Bora. A 15-minute shuttle boat to the island and a 25-minute ride in an old truck converted into a personnel carrier got us to "Club Med" Bora Bora. Bora Bora is one of the islands in the French Polynesia chain. The island is surrounded by coral reef with only one small opening, which was created by the Navy during WWII. As one flies to Bora Bora , it is hard not to be in awe of the emerald waters surrounding the island. I have never seen ocean water as radiantly green. The island is quite small with very little habitable land. The bulk of the island is a solid mountain of rock with less than a ¹/₂ mile of flat land surrounding it. It has only one road, on which you can circumvent the entire island in one hour.

Bora Bora is well known for its shark and manta ray dives. We had signed up to do both before leaving the States. The dive boat took eight of us to the outside of the reef at 9:00 in the morning. The French divemasters explained that there would be blacktip reef sharks ("as big as a man") and lemon sharks ("bigger than a man"). I have to admit that I was a little intimidated at the thought of swimming with sharks, but what the heck—"They wouldn't sell tickets if it wasn't safe," I thought. After a brief orientation we enjoyed the luxury of simply donning a weight belt, buckling on our BCs, and jumping into the 82-degree water. Visibility was well over 150 feet, which made it easy to see that we were surrounded by sharks from the moment we entered the water. "Maybe this wasn't the best idea I ever had," I thought.



We descended 80 ft to the bottom and were surrounded by 30 or 40 sharks. The dive masters had told us not to get too close and "don't wiggle your fingers at the sharks!" We were told to swim around as we normally would. I have seen videos of other shark dives where the divers had to stay on the bottom or hang onto a rope. Swimming with the sharks was much more exciting. The dive masters did a little feeding to get the sharks to converge in the area and then left them to comb the reef. The large lemon sharks would sometimes come uncomfortably close to the divers. After spending most dives keeping an eye out for predators, we all found that it took about half a tank of air to get our adrenaline down. Once we did, the spectacle of gliding with 10-foot sharks was absolutely thrilling. I kept my camera going the whole time I was down, since the water was alive with sharks the entire time. This was the best dive I had ever experienced.

We returned to the dock to refresh our tanks and headed out to the opening of the reef to dive with manta rays. The visibility was much less because of the rush of water coming from the open sea into the sheltered area of the island. We glided over the reef in 60 feet of water for about 10 minutes before we saw a shadow appear. The divers paused as a giant manta slid into view. With a wingspan of 12 feet, it was the largest creature I had ever seen underwater.



The manta glided right at us with almost no movement. It veered off about 10 feet from the group. Almost immediately, another appeared from the distance. Singles and pairs of mantas cruised us for the next 25 minutes. They would come within 10 to 12 feet and then bank off. Occasionally, the water would get dark and I would look up to find one swimming directly above my head as I was filming. The ballet of their effortless movement captivated all of the divers. We were all filled with a calm sense of awe at being in the vicinity of the enormous mantas. As we began our ascent I noticed a group of maybe 12 blacktip sharks encircling us all the way to the boat.

In the boat there was a very different atmosphere compared to the previous dive. There was a tranquility that is rare for a group of divers just out of the water. The mantas had placed us all under their spell. Chalk that up as another wonderful underwater experience.

I dove again another day at different locations around the island. The reefs were extremely healthy for all the diving that takes place on them. Myriad tropical fish abounded within the folds of the coral. There were many brilliantly colored giant clams wedged in the crevices of the coral. Their mantles were vibrant blue, red, orange, and green. Stingrays were all over the reefs, as well as clownfish, angels, triggerfish, and trumpet fish. Coming back to the boat we found a Napoleon fish. This is a large fish with a very unusual shape.

I have to say that after years of diving, we come to a point where we are looking for new and different underwater topography and creatures. Bora Bora provides a great opportunity to experience the unique. It proved to be one of the high spots in my diving adventures. I highly recommend it to any of you.

Berserk in the Antarctic

Berserk in the Antarctic is the incredible story of three young men who risk their lives again and again on board their little yacht, the *Berserk*. From day one, the voyage is a fight for their lives in the teeth of hurricanes and ice floes

in a 25-year-old yacht, which is falling more and more apart and has no engine, because the latter only works when the sun is shining.....Dave Mercy, one of the adventurers, will join us for a viewing of the film and a question and answer time following the showing.



Scuba Rangers Program


Kandie at Santa Barbara Aquatics sent along this flyer on the Scuba Rangers program, starting in June.
