

## Platform Grace Trip Report, 9-19-2004

The story you are about to read is true. Only the names have been changed to protect the innocent. Dum ta-dum dum-dum. It was Wednesday. My name isn't Friday. The place: Channel Islands Harbor, on board the *Peace*. The time: 6:50 a.m. Where the hell is my dive buddy? Off in the distance, "Bob" appears, hauling his dive gear. "What happened, Bob? You know the *Peace* leaves at the stroke of 7?" "Uh, I overslept, sorry." In retrospect, it might have been better if he had missed the boat.

The weather was calm, with low clouds that cleared early. The water was glassy. It was an ideal August morning. We had an uneventful passage out to Platform Grace. Even though it was midweek, the boat was filled. There was a trimix class planning a



series of technical dives to 250 feet. There were several rebreathers, and most of the rest were diving nitrox. Having just completed a nitrox class, I was anxious to try out my newly acquired skills and dive to 100 feet to practice photography.

The boat was filled with a wide array of photography equipment, but the clear favorite seemed to be the Olympus C5050z. There were at least five of them, including mine. Upon arrival at the platform, the boat crew explained that since the boat doesn't moor with the platform, they run the prop continuously to position the boat. Therefore, we had to giant stride into the water from the bow. To get the camera gear, they load all of it into a zodiac before the divers enter the water. I jumped, swam to the zodiac, got my camera and clipped it to my BC. Bob jumped, swam over to the zodiac, got his camera and cinched the wrist lanyard. He then realized that he was bobbing a little low in the water and started fumbling for his inflator. "Where's my inflator? Where's my inflator?" he asked. I swam behind him and handed him his inflator. He filled, and then asked, "Where's my camera?!" At this point, I figured it was probably around 100 feet and accelerating. The bottom is an inaccessible 340 feet.

With that inauspicious beginning, we began our descent to 100 feet. Keeping track of depth was easy since the platform has cross braces every 33 feet. On the surface, the temperature was around 64° and the visibility was 40-50 feet. I was maybe two pounds over-weighted since I had been doing so much shore diving. It certainly seemed like the BC took a lot of air to arrest the decent. At about 60 feet there was a distinct thermocline. The temperature dropped to 55-58° and the visibility opened up to an astounding 80 feet. Even at 100 feet, there was plenty of light to observe the enormous scallops and metridium anemones. We spent the entire first dive on a single stanchion of the platform in a linear vertical space. I was as happy as a scallop, fiddling with the camera, when I noticed that Bob was substantially higher in the water column. The narcosis that was making me feel at peace with the world was giving him tunnel vision. Time to ascend.

We made two more dives on the platform. The tide had changed and the visibility dropped, making the whole structure morph into an eerie waterscape. If you squinted, the columns began to look like an ancient Greek temple, and you could almost believe that you had stumbled across the lost city of Atlantis. As the dive drew to a close, the sea lions, which had been basking on the mooring platform, decided to dive-bomb us and show off just how graceful they are. I stopped trying to be a photographer and simply put the camera on high-speed sequential capture and held the shutter button down. The vast majority of the images are horribly motion blurred, except for one gem.

The trip wound down with clear skies and a bright sun. The hot tub was un-crowded since most were diving dry. Their loss was my gain. Another day in paradise...
