cially adopted beach at Tajiguas and with the Vandenburg Aqualiers picked up 245 lbs of trash and 225 lbs of recycling. Well done!

of use hit the ocean and enjoyed the generally calm conditions and clear water. It was wonderfully warm 63F and after 72 minutes of bottom time, I wasn't the slighted bit cold. Noah Phillips and I checked out the reef near the point. Since the surf was so low we were able to get much closer to the point than usual and were treated to an abundance of shovelnose rays, bat rays, and even a halibut and octopus.

PDC also maintains an informational kiosk on the east side of the beach with photos that show the underwater sea life and provide information about the underwater park. Cheryl Weakleim and I took it apart and gave it a much-needed cleaning and facelift.



We had a great turnout with about 50 people attending. Thanks for everyone's efforts. I have to say the beach looks MARVELOUS. Lets hope that it stays that way!

Finally! After two aborted attempts to dive on the Sunfish, I got the chance to head out to sea with the crew of the Sunfish. The prior attempts were cancelled due to not enough paying customers. Something about the cost of fuel in today's market. While I understood that problem, it was still disappointing. But hey, I was diving for free so I had to go with the flow.

So, the day came without the last minute cancellation, and down to Oxnard I went. Having not been to that harbor before, I got lost. Oh great, I thought. They finally head out when I am allowed to go with them and I'm gonna miss the boat. Thankfully, I have my cell phone and they are answering the call. Literally.

I get to the boat and load my gear. To quote their website: The boat was previously owned by Island Packers, in Ventura. It was used for a day shuttle and tour boat to the islands. It was completely renovated, from the deck being removed and replaced, to all new mechanical, electronics, and refiberglassed.... It has a live well, fresh hot water shower, private dressing room, mask rinse, camera tanks, self-service galley, low deck(two small steps down to dive platform) no ladders to climb, and two tank fill compressors(4500psi).

The crew is friendly and professional. They are eager to help and informative. We have about 6 students on board, so the dive sites are picked with care to insure that you don't get in over your head. Ok. A bad choice of words. But you get my drift. Ok. Another one.

We went out to Anacapa to scope out the dive sites. The Sunfish is 53' x 20' and is fairly fast, so the crossing did not take long. We did two dives before lunch and two after lunch. Between the morning dives they provided fresh cut fruit and hot chicken noodle soup, which was quite good, although having a slotted serving spoon for soup was a bit unusual. Suffice it to say that it hit the spot.

Lunch was a plate of various cold cuts and more fruit. The choice of meats and cheeses were nice, and the bread was large so no one went hungry. They had a variety of dessert snacks, cookies, brownies, and fruit. The fridge was stocked with soft drinks and water bottles that were more than adequate for the divers on board.

They have 4 hoses to refill the tanks, so there was no delay in getting into the water when we got to the dive sites. The rear dive step is easy to access, and there was no ladder to climb, so my old tired knees had no trouble getting back on the boat.

As noted above, they had a dressing room in the galley area that was very nice for changing. Knowing that it was the only one on the boat, and that I was diving a dry suit, I got geared up early so I did not have to fight for space.

As to the diving, what can I say? Anacapa Island was wonderful, as usual. The viz was between 25 and 30 feet. The temp was about 65 degrees. We swam in the kelp to our hearts content. A fairly large bat ray was the highlight of the trip. That and getting caught in a current while under water with a newly certified diver, requiring the rescue buoy to get back to the boat. Hey, I wanted to see how she could handle the unexpected.

All in all, it was another good day of diving. The sun came out in the afternoon, so the ride home was warm. Heading back we could see a massive cloud of smoke over the mountains behind Santa Barbara. It looked like an atomic bomb had detonated. Many on board were from out of the area (my dive buddies were from Denmark) and they were amazed at the effects of the Zaca fire.

The only negatives to the boat that I can report about the boat are that it does not have enough hand holds if the sea gets rough, and there is relatively little shade available when the sun comes out. Other than that, it was a good boat.

On returning to the harbor, I said goodbye to my new Danish friends, and thanked the captain and crew. Given the chance, I would definitely dive the Sunfish again. Especially if it was free.
