The Aging Dive Population

As we age we all face various issues associated with the mere fact of age. Most of the things that we as aging divers must deal with are the same kinds of things that our landlocked compadres deal with as well. Joints start to creak. Muscles do not loosen up as easily as they used to. We get winded after only a short swim. Our wetsuits start to shrink and feel tighter. You know; the standard stuff.

But there are other things that we as divers need to be more aware of simply because of the nature of our sport. One of those is the issue of diving with diabetes. While I have no idea if any of our members have it, diabetes can be a very significant concern, whether you have Type I or Type II.

In the old days a diagnosis of diabetes was the death knell for your diving career. The

conventional wisdom was that if you had it, you've had it. You were no longer allowed to dive. The risk of going into insulin shock, or having a hypoglycemic episode was considered too great to allow you to go off into the deep. And let's face it, who wants to be unconscious down at 90 feet? That can make for a real difficult deco stop!!

Over the years, as more and more people got into diving, the medical/scientific community started to be asked to re-evaluate the prohibition of allowing people with diabetes to dive. Divers who aged and became diabetics were not so willing to hang up their fins and focus only on golf. So, studies were conducted by several reputable organizations to determine if a complete ban was really in order.

Many of these studies were either sponsored by Divers Alert Network (DAN) or reported on by DAN. Several of the studies were then repeated years later to confirm and fine tune the conclusions. Recently, DAN published the results of a study sponsored jointly by DAN and the Undersea and Hyperbaric Medical Society (UHMS) in Durham NC.

As stated in its web site: The Undersea and Hyperbaric Medical Society (UHMS) was formed in 1967. It is an international nonprofit association serving some 2,000 physicians, scientists. associates and nurses from more than 50 countries in the fields of hyperbaric and dive medicine. The UHMS is an important source of scientific and medical information pertaining to hyperbaric medicine involving hyperbaric oxygen therapy and diving through its bimonthly, peer-reviewed journal, Undersea and Hyperbaric Medicine, symposia, workshops, books and other publications. It organizes an annual scientific meeting at different U.S. and international locations to permit review of the latest in research and treatment and to promote the highest standards of practice

The group conducted a meeting in 2005 with more than 50 participants from seven countries taking part. As a result of the work, new guidelines were issued regarding diving with diabetes. For anyone interested in seeing them, those guidelines may be found at the following link:

La Janelle Clam Dive -Steve Trainoff

Tivela stultorum ala La Janelle At least that is what I am going to call my new recipe. Take one part cruise liner, add rocks, and let rest for 29 years. Add one part Paradise Dive Club, one home-made clam gauge, one fishing license, 10 parts Pismo Clams and you have a great shore dive and the makings of one great bowl of soup. On Jan 31, 2009 we tested this recipe with 6 divers and a handful of onlookers.

The La Janelle was once a stately liner that held over 1000 passengers in luxury, but on April 13, 1970 she dragged anchor and sunk in the surf off of Port Hueneme; a sad end to its long and distinguished career. Now however, its wreck forms one arm of the Port Hueneme breakwater and shields the incoming waves to form a nice sandy beach. It is a favorite of the local surfers, but when the waves are low, it is a great place to go diving for the not so elusive Pismo Clam.

Pismo Clams are one of the largest clams found along the California coast. To fish them, you need a fishing license and a clam gauge. Most people wait for an extreme low tide and wade in the surf with a pitchfork and sift though the sand. However, with scuba gear, you don't have to wait. The minimum legal size is 4.5" across, but I barely needed to use my home-made gauge since the clams were all easily over the limit. It was a fun event, although after a while of collecting, I felt like I was dragging an anchor with me. It is funny how they get even heavier out of the water. By the end of the dive I staggered up the beach with 8 enormous clams. And yes... they made great chowder.
