Diving San Clemente & Santa Barbara

Living in Santa Barbara means that we almost always have access to a good dive within a few minutes, and *really* great diving within a couple of hours. Even better, we have access to world-class diving most people would consider a trip of the year, if not of a lifetime. A few weeks ago, we enjoyed a trip like that on one of our favorite boats, the *Peace*. Club sponsor Anacapa Dive Center does a yearly trip to the southern Channel Islands we've thought about a number of times, but this year a combination of free time and not having been diving for weeks made it impossible to pass up.

We left Ventura Harbor at 10 pm on Friday night and had a very smooth crossing. So smooth, in fact, that we slept until the *Peace* was almost at the first dive site. We had time for a little coffee before the morning briefing and the boat arriving at our first site of the day--which took a little finding as the crew sought to keep us out of as much current as possible. After a little maneuvering around both sides of the east side of the island, we dropped anchor at Sun Point and began a long but very enjoyable day that totaled six dives. Even with a busy, busy schedule--including one night dive--the alwayshelpful crew, never let us feel rushed; long gate times meant everyone had plenty of time to get in and out.

San Clemente is renowned for its exceptional visibility, and although those with more experience said conditions weren't as good as they could get, the combination of 40 feet or more of visibility and water temperatures getting as high as 70F, they seemed pretty great to us. Even relatively warm water can take a lot out of you on repetitive dives, so we were glad to have our trusty drysuits.

The kelp and fish populations were really healthy. In addition to the usual local suspects we saw a small school of barracuda, several yellowtail, a handful of octopuses-including a couple out cruising the reef or bottom during the daytime--colorful juvenile Garibaldi and blacksmith, and even a large green moray.

Sunday was cooler and grayer, which, combined with the smaller island's more exposed location, made for colder, murkier water, but the diving was still quite nice. The day's first two dives, at Sutil Rock and Webster Point, were sea lion rookeries and we were treated to some great interaction with curious and playful juveniles. Webster was especially fun with a dozen or so animals coming out to swim around with us on the rocky flats. We wrapped things up at Cat Canyon, a really pretty spot with more healthy kelp and interesting rocky reefs filled with plenty of fish.

Even having as much fun as we were, after nine dives, we were ready for the longish trip home. Fortunately, the crossing was again very pleasant--topped off by large pods of dolphins coming to surf the bow wave and great views of Anacapa and Santa Cruz from different angles than we usually see as we returned.

Black 20mil Pipe Wrap Tape is better than duct tape. A 50' roll 2" wide is about \$6. It is totally water proof and sun proof. Tape weights together in bundles for your BC. Tape the straps on your scuba pro fins so that they don't catch on kelp. Any thing that you use duct tape for, the Pipe wrap will work for and is more permanent.
